WHEN/HOW ARE THE PHS SCHOOL COUNSELORS MEETING WITH STUDENTS?

- ► Senior (12) Seminar (this week)
- ▶ Junior (11) Seminar (October); Junior Advisement Sessions (Oct-Dec)
- Sophomore (10) Seminar (Oct & March)
- Freshmen (9) (September & February)
- Students are encouraged to make appointments w/ their counselor once a year
- Students/Parents can email their counselor if they have a question
- Small groups
- Emergency situations (PRIØRITY!)

THINGS TO CONSIDER/DO

Seniors

- Are you registered for the classes you need to graduate?
- ► HOPE eligibility is not determined until you graduate.
- Schools have the right to deny your acceptance after receiving final transcript...keep up your grades!
- Scholarships offered from the college have deadlines that are usually before regular decision deadlines (around December)

Juniors

- Attend Junior Advisement w/ student & counselor.
- Begin researching colleges/careers that match your interest
- ▶ Go to college fairs
- Visit colleges of interest
- Study & take the SAT, ACT or ACCUPLACER
- Make a list of 3-5 colleges that you want to apply to

THINGS TO CONSIDER/DO

Sophomores

- Prepare for and take the PSAT
- Join and participate in extra-curricular activities
- Think about adding rigorous courses to your schedule
- Explore potential careers & colleges via Naviance

Freshmen

- Get off to a good start with your grades
- Participate and join extracurricular activities
- Think about adding rigorous courses to your schedule
- Don't forget colleges can see your freshmen grades


GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS

The requirements below represent minimal courses needed for high school graduation. A weighted GPA of 3.5 or higher is required to be an honor graduate.

Pebblebrook's GPA Calculation



Cumulative Weighted GPA: 3.000
Cumulative UnWeighted GPA: 3.000

Cumulative = EVERYTHING on the transcript (core + electives)//
Weighted = Pebblebrook's weight (.5 for Honors, 1.0 for APs)
Unweighted = No weight at all!

TYPES OF GRADE POINT AVERAGES (GPA'S)

- ► Cumulative (or overall) GPA
 - Both GPAs on your transcript are cumulative
 - ▶ These GPAs include electives in addition to core
 - ► Most colleges recalculate GPA using your transcript and look further than your CCSD GPA
- Academic or Core GPA (NOT on transcript)
 - Only English, Math, Science, Social Studies, and World Languages courses
 - Can be weighted or unweighted
 - Most colleges are interested in only the academic classes
- **▶** HOPE GPA
 - Academic, weighted GPA
 - Weights differently than CCSD
 - ▶ 0 for Honors; .5 for AP
 - NOT on transcript; can be found at
 - www.gafutures.org



WORKFORCE/APPRENTICESHIP

- ➤ On-the-job short-term or long-term training is provided by an employer at the beginning of a new job.
- Training can last 1 5 years, often paid.
- The completion of an apprenticeship is generally associated with skilled labor.
- ► These kinds of programs can lead to secure and well-paying jobs without the need for any college expenses.
- ▶ It is possible that the job will pay for future school/college.



MILITARY/ARMED FORCES

- ► High School Diploma is required.
- ► Take the Armed Services Vocational

 Aptitude Battery (ASVAB) when offered.
- Contact an Armed Forces recruiter of your chosen branch of interest.
 - Recruiters visit the school often (during lunch, check Naviance)
- Request your final transcript in May

ASVAB will be offered to 10-12th graders in Oct. Students will need to sign up! Date TBD



TECHNICAL COLLEGE/ PROFESSIONAL TRAINING PROGRAMS

- Typically completed in two years or less
- Certificate or Diploma programs
- Career-focused
 - Trains students for a specific job in a career field
- Examples of jobs:
 - Welding
 - Cosmetology
 - Construction Worker
 - Automotive, HVAC, Electrician
 - Dental Assistant
 - Carpenter
 - Plumber
 - CNA, Phlebotomist, Medical Assistan
- Local Examples: Chattahoochee Tech, Gwinnett Tech (any TCSG) Paul Mitchell Institute, Fortis College, Lincoln Tech, Strayer, etc.



2-YEAR COLLEGES & TECHNICAL COLLEGES



Check with individual school to see if the SAT/ACT is required- may take the **Accuplacer Exam** instead



Two-year school requirements –

Requirements vary by 2-year College and Technical School. Check website for current requirements




Transcript Requests – Most will require a minimum of your final transcript for proof of graduation. Follow transcript request process.

Local Examples: Georgia Highlands, Perimeter College, Chattahoochee Tech, Atlanta Metro State College, etc.

4-YEAR COLLEGE/UNIVERSITY

- ► Typically have higher admission requirements
 - i.e. higher GPA, higher test scores
- On average it takes students four years to complete
- Students work towards a Bachelor's, Master's, Specialist's, Doctorate.
- SAT/ACT Test Scores are usually required
 Local Examples: Kennesaw State, Georgia State, Clarke Atlanta, Spellman, Morehouse, UGA, GT, Emory, Albany State University, Oglethorpe, etc.





FACTORS FOR COLLEGE ADMISSION

Additional factors:

- Extracurricular Activities
- Essays
- Letters of Recommendation
- Demonstrated Interest

Points to Consider:

BUILDING A COLLEGE LIST

"Reach schools" are those where your academic credentials fall below the school's average range for the freshman class.

"Match schools" are schools where your academic credentials fall within or perhaps slightly exceed the school's average range for the freshman class.

"Safety schools" are schools you will almost definitely get into because your academic credentials are much better than the typical average range for the freshman class. **REACH SCHOOLS**

Apply to 1 or 2

RANGE SCHOOLS

Apply to 2 or 3

SAFETY SCHOOLS

Apply to at least 1

How Do I Learn More About Schools?

- ☐ Research
 - □ Naviance
 - www.gafutures.org
 - □ College's websites
- Meet with College Reps when they visit PHS or out in the local community
- ☐ Attend college fairs in the area
- ☐ Visit campus(es) while class is in session to get a feel of how the campus looks
- □ Open houses sponsored by colleges—they roll out the red carpet for these events
- □ Social Media pages

Don't Put All Your Eggs In One Basket!

- Students need to apply to more than one college/university.
 - ☐ Typically students apply to 3-5 colleges
 - ☐ Magnet students apply to 5-10+ colleges
- Reach School(s) your core GPA and test scores are BELOW the college freshmen profile
- □ <u>Target School(s)</u>—your core GPA and test scores MATCH the college freshmen profile.
- Safety School(s) your core GPA and test scores are ABOVE the college freshmen profile
- □ ALWAYS HAVE A LOCAL BACK UP COLLEGE in case of emergency

SAT and ACT

General Info about Tests

- 2-3 times is the recommended advice on how many times you should take it.
- ☐ Check with the college for the last test date they will accept for the application deadline
- □ SAT and ACT scores must be sent directly from the testing agency.
- ☐ Some schools will super score your ACT score. (Super scorewhen a college takes the highest sub scores from various test dates to get a new higher super score)

□ <u>SAT</u>

- □ www.sat.org/register
- ☐ Measures evidence-based Reading and Writing and Math. <u>The essay is OPTIONAL.</u>
- ☐ No penalty for guessing.
- \square New scale ranging from 400 to 1600.

ACT

- □ www.actstudent.org
- □ Measures classroom achievement (knowledge) in four broad content areas as well as the ability to reason and to apply problem-solving skills
- ☐ Four content areas: English, Math, Science, and Reading
- ☐ No guessing penalty and all multiple choice

UNIVERSITY SYSTEM OF GA TEST OPTIONAL INFO



The University System of Georgia (USG) will continue the temporary waiver of test score requirements for Academic Year 2024-2025 (Fall 2024, Spring 2025, and Summer 2025) admission at 23 of the 26 USG institutions. The temporary waiver does not apply to the Georgia Institute of Technology, the University of Georgia, or Georgia College and State University.

- ► For Academic Year 2024-2025, the remaining institutions have two options to make admission decisions:
- Freshman index: Includes high school grade point average and test scores for either the SAT or ACT.
- 2. Test Optional: Use the high school grade point average on the required high school curriculum without a standardized test score at the following minimum grade point averages:
- 3.4 GPA for research universities: Augusta University and Georgia State University.
- 3.2 GPA for comprehensive universities: Kennesaw State University, Georgia Southern University, University of West Georgia and Valdosta State University.
- 3.0 GPA for state universities: Albany State University, Clayton State University, Columbus State University, Fort Valley State University, Georgia Southwestern State University, Middle Georgia State University, Savannah State University and the University of North Georgia.
- State colleges (Abraham Baldwin Agricultural College, Atlanta Metropolitan State College, College of Coastal Georgia, Dalton State College, East Georgia State College, Georgia Gwinnett College, Georgia Highlands College, Gordon State College and South Georgia State College) continue to be test optional in accordance with Board policy.

APPLICATION PLATFORMS



- One that the college created
- GAFutures Application <u>www.gafutures.org</u>
 - Many GA colleges use GAFutures to "house" their applications (a "mini" common app)
- Common Application www.CommonApp.org
 - ► The Common App has 900+ member colleges
 - Complete one "common" application and submit to many colleges
 - Many colleges require supplements, in addition to the "common" portion
 - Extra essays
 - Self-reported grades
- ► Coalition Application http://www.coalitionforcollegeaccess.org/
 - Over 150 institutions have joined
 - Similar to Common App
- Common Black College Application www.commonblackcollegeapp.com
 - ▶ 55 different HBCU's
 - One \$20 application fee to apply to all 55 colleges
 - ▶ Register for top 4 but can be accepted from any of the 55 colleges











- They have no preference
- Use the application that is best for you.

UNDERSTANDING APPLICATION TYPES

- Regular Decision
 - Deadline date established by the institution
- ► Early Decision (I &II): Binding
 - ► Cannot apply **early decision** to other colleges, can only apply regular decision.
 - If accepted, must attend (BINDING)
- Early Action: Non-Binding
 - Can apply early to other colleges, can apply regular decision
- Single Choice/Restricted Early Action: Non-Binding
 - Cannot apply early to other colleges, can apply regular decision
- Rolling Admission
 - Open admission, decisions given throughout the year not at a specific time
- Priority Deadline
 - Similar to rolling admissions but priority given to those applicants who meet earlier priority deadline

COLLEGE APPLICATION PROCESS (STEP BY STEP)

- 1. Determine what colleges you are applying to
- 2. Determine application types/platform
- Complete supplemental items, if necessary (essay(s), resume, personal statement, etc.)
- 4. Submit your college applications
- 5. Pay for application fee (Find out if/how college accepts fee waivers)
- 6. Send your test scores via College Board/ACT, if required/needed
- 5. Use Naviance our "delivery" system -- to:
- Invite teacher recommenders, if needed
- -Request transcripts
- Complete Counselor Letter of Rec Survey, if needed
- 6. **Track your status (using institution website)

WAYS TO PAY FOR COLLEGE

- ▶ Personal Finances
- ▶ 529 Savings Plan/College Savings Account
- Scholarships (free money)
- Grants (free money)
- ► Loans (pay back with interest)
 - ► Local bank
 - ▶ Federal Loans identified in FAFSA
 - ► Subsidized & Unsubsidized
 - Student Loans-in student's name
 - ▶ Parent Plus Loans-in parent's name

HOW DO I FIND \$\$\$ FOR COLLEGE

- Scholarships
 - Types of Scholarships
 - Colleges (Check college's website)
 - National (Gates, Questbridge, CollegeBoard, etc.)
 - Corporations (Does your employer have scholarships?)
 - ► Local (Mabelton, Rotary, PTSA, etc.)
 - Athletic (full or partial)
 - Performing Arts
 - Scholarship section in Naviance
 - Do not pay for a scholarship search. You shouldn't have to pay for FREE money!
 - ▶ Research
 - www.goingmerry.com
 - ► GAfutures.org: special state & federal grants'
 - Google "College Scholarships"

FAFSA WWW. STUDENTAID. GOU

- ► Federal Government is currently updating application to be 35 questions (only) and to be easier
- Will open in December/January timeframe (we don't know date yet)
- ▶ Based on prior year taxes. Class of 2024 will use 2022 taxes
- ▶ Both parent & student have parts to complete on the application
- ► HOPE & Zell Miller Grants/Scholarships done via FAFSA completion
- ▶ If parent does not have a SSN but student does, this is ok....the student is still eligible for Federal Aid from the gov't. There is one small extra step students must do in this situation.

GEORGIA'S HOPE PROGRAM > All HOPE programs require students to:

- Be a legal resident of Georgia
- Be registered with Selective Service, males only
- Be in compliance with the Georgia Drug-Free Post-secondary Education Act of 1990
- Meet HOPE's US citizenship or eligible non-citizen requirements
- Attend an eligible Georgia school

HOW TO CHECK YOUR CURRENT HOPE GPA

- ▶ Go to www.gafutures.org
- ► Login to My GAFutures
 - Create account
 - Must enter SSN
 - See Counselor if you cannot gain access as it is possible that we do not have your SSN on file.
 - Name must match what we have on school records
- ► Click Your HOPE GPA
- ► Follow directions to get your HOPE GPA.

SCHOLARSHIPS FROM HOPE PROGRAM

Zell Miller Scholarship

- Graduate valedictorian or salutatorian
- By your graduation date earn
 - ► 4 Rigor Points
 - ▶ 3.7 HOPE GPA

AND

► Earn a 1200 SAT (ELA & MA) on a single administration

<u>OR</u>

- Earn 26 composite score on a single administration of ACT
- Recipient must have a 3.3 GPA at checkpoints to maintain scholarship.

HOPE Scholarship

- ► Earn a 3.0 HOPE GPA in high school (calculated by GA Student Finance Commission)
- Recipients must have 3.0 GPA at checkpoints to maintain scholarship
- ▶ 4 rigor points

GRANTS FROM THE HOPE PROGRAM

Zell Miller Grant

- ► Covers full standard rate of tuition.
- ► Maintain a cumulative GPA of 3.5 each term in college.

HOPE Grant

- ► Covers a percentage of the standard rate of tuition.
- Must maintain a cumulative GPA of 2.0 each term in college.

Available to students seeking a technical certification or diploma regardless of high school GPA or graduation date



PARENTAL STUMBLING BLOCKS

- Dictating exactly where your student must apply and attend
- □ Completing all tasks related to their college applications!!!
 - ☐ Give them ownership of their future.
 - Doing all the work for your student doesn't teach him/her the coping skills needed for college or in life!
- FERPA-Become familiar with Federal FERPA laws which will pertain to you and your student when they reach 18 years of age.
